

Ever get the heebie-jeebies when you have to speak to a large group? Join us on November 14 at 2:30 p.m. when Dan Sharp, PhD, will share how you can conquer your fear of public speaking. Sharp will show you why and how fear is manageable. He will provide tips derived from four decades of speaking that make it easier to deal with the pre-talk jitters. One fact to remember is that nobody knows more about what you have to say, than you!

Sharp will discuss the fear mechanism, why and how we fear, because understanding fear is a key to managing it. He will give tips he has learned that helped him give scientific presentations over the years. Emeritus Professor of Physiology with the Department of Animal Sciences at the University of Florida, Sharp has learned how to be comfortable speaking to large audiences. He has studied the mechanisms of fear and shares these tips to help others who suffer minor anxieties or absolute fear.


SYNERGY was GREAT!

5 Dangers Of Sharing Your Creative Writing Using Social Media

Sharing your writing on social media may seem like a great idea, especially when you're getting lots of Likes and retweets to lift your spirits. But wait—the experts here at Web Design Relief want to warn you about a few possible dangers of posting your creative writing on social networking websites.

Submitting your short story to literary journals is the tried-and-true method of getting your work published and in front of your audience. But with the Internet providing so many other options, you may wonder—why wait for that elusive acceptance from a lit mag editor? What about posting your short stories on social media or on websites to connect with your readers *now*?

Before you eagerly press "post"—stop! Posting your short story and inviting people to read your work on your blog may seem like a good idea, but it could be an invitation to disaster.

Posting on Social Media

The Dangers Of Sharing Your Poems, Stories, Essays, Or Book Excerpts On Social

Networking Websites

Even if you restrict the audience for your creative writing post, others may still read it. Some social media websites let you choose who sees what. But the mechanisms aren't foolproof, and there are always ways around them. If you post online, be prepared—your audience might be bigger than you expected.

There are no take-backs. After your writing has been posted on social media, you might decide to delete your post. Perhaps you don't like the way readers (or trolls) are reacting. In hindsight, maybe the material feels too personal for social media. Unfortunately, social sharing means it's not always possible to erase all occurrences of a given work. You should always assume that once you've shared something on social media, it may be on the Internet forever.

Often a post on social media is considered previously published writing. It's important to understand what constitutes "previously published writing" (https://webdesignrelief.com/2017/04/one-thing-author-website-kill-shot-publication/) to various publishing industry professionals.

For poets, story authors, and essayists, most <u>literary journal and magazine editors</u> will automatically decline any writing that's been published—anywhere—in print or on the Internet. There may be some gray areas regarding whether sharing your work on social media is the same thing as publishing it. Each editor has his or her own opinions, so be sure to carefully read each journal's submission guidelines.

Book authors, however, don't face the same potential limitations when they share part or even ALL of a book using social media or any other platform. If lots of people have read and loved a book via social media, that book could be considered self-published. Literary agents and editors will no doubt want to scoop it up (and snag their share of profits).

You risk plagiarism. Because social media makes it so incredibly easy to share things that catch people's attention, there is a danger that the originator of a piece and the material could be irrevocably separated. For an example, consider how many images you see on social media that don't have attributions. You'll have to decide if losing control over your writing is worth sharing it on social media.

Be sure you know the risks before you put your materials out there. It could cost you a publication in the long run.

Posting on Social Media

The #1 Reason To Never Post Your Complete Short Story Anywhere On The Web:

If you post your complete short story online, most literary journal editors will consider it published—and will no longer be interested. And, yes, that includes your blog, any other blog, and social media platforms such as Facebook, Pinterest, Tumblr, Google+, etc. Are there exceptions to this rule? Yes, there are literary journals that will accept submissions that have already appeared online. But which online venues are considered acceptable differ from journal to journal, so it's very important to check each individual magazine's submission guidelines. Your best choice—and the one that will provide you with the largest selection of publishing markets—is to make sure your work does not appear anywhere that would be considered previously published.

How To Safely Share Your Short Story Online

Publish a mini-excerpt! While we don't recommend publishing your complete short story online, an enticing first paragraph, some captivating <u>dialogue</u> filled with subtext, or a pivotal scene from your story will all work wonderfully as mini-excerpts. And by posting an excerpt instead of the whole story, you'll build interest without running the risk of the piece be considered "previously published" by editors. Just be sure that your excerpt is less than 10% of the total piece.

Stick to private workshops. If an online workshop or writing group is private and cannot be accessed by the general public, it should be a <u>safe place to post your work.</u>

Post a short story that's already been published. If a work has already been published in a literary journal and you now hold the rights, you can post that short story on your website or blog. Another option: Link directly to the online literary journal that your short story appears in.

Write a short story specifically to be posted. You can create a short story with the intention of publishing it on your own website. Since it's not a piece that you will later send out to literary magazines, you don't have to worry about the fact that it's been previously published.

Posting on Social Media

You may lose your audience's attention. Keep in mind that Web-browsing readers tend to have a shorter attention span than people who sit down with the intention of blocking off time for dedicated reading. Web readers want a payoff for reading—fast. To make a big impact, consider keeping the writing that you share on social media on the short side.

The Best Way To Share Your Writing Via Social Media

Instead of posting your entire poem, story, or essay on social media, consider posting a teaser (a little bit of text) that links to your author website. There, readers can read the full piece.

Directing people to your author website gives you the opportunity to turn a happenstance reader into a fan who keeps coming back—especially if you require visitors to sign up for your author mailing list in order to read more.

Having visitors come to your author website might lessen the possibility of online thievery, but keep in mind that no controls are foolproof on the Internet. Even if you block "cutting and pasting" on your website, users could find a way to share your writing without proper author attribution.

Weigh the pros and cons, make your decision, and then commit to enjoying the process—wherever it may lead!


