Character Building: Outside the Box – by

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Kathy Dobronyi, a passionate storyteller and writer, will speak at the Writers Alliance of Gainesville meeting on October 8, 2023, at 2:30 p.m. at the Millhopper branch of the Alachua County Library. Come join us! The program is free and open to the public.

Every writer has strengths and weaknesses in different areas. One writer can think up exciting plot twists for every scene but struggles with bringing characters to the page. Another writer presents sharp dialogue but isn't so great at creating settings. Dobronyi says she is guilty of being that sort of writer.

"In my last life," she says, "I was a high school drama coach who taught the development of morgue books to help create characters and scenes. With portfolios of pictures saved in folders, envelopes, or three-ring binders, morgue books help to bring abstract individuals and scenes to life." She also taught high school special education programs, introducing students to hands-on projects for language arts, history, communication, and drama.

Dobronyi was born at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, and baptized three years later at Fort Meade in Maryland. She was in Hawaii when it became our fiftieth state and in Vietnam when it became the American War Zone.

Her narrative memoir, *Under the Wings of a Good Luck Phoenix* shares her story of being one of 4,000 American civilians living in Saigon in 1963 when she was twelve.

She is now working on her first historical novel, *Echoes of War*, the story of Amos Hillyard, a seventeen-year-old boy, who was captured with thirteen other Quakers by the Virginia Militia in Winchester, Virginia, on September 23, 1777, on the eve of the Battle of Germantown.


John Hemingway to Speak at Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings State Park.



WAG wants to entice you—yes, YOU—to throw off your beach towel and wade into the refreshing pool that is the *Hogtowne Quill*. To that end, we are introducing three new dedicated blog topics and expanding a fourth. These are:

1. Humor & Satire (500-1,000 words)

Do you have any writing or grammar pet peeves? (Nauseous vs. nauseated—amirite? Overuse of exclamation points? Guilty!) Ever had an embarrassing run-in with an author or a fan? (Ask me about the time I humiliated myself in a public bathroom by going full-fangirl on Joyce Carol Oates.) Check out [Bacopa Literary Review 2022's](#) “An Open Letter to Eowyn of Rohan, Regarding the Amazingness of Her Hair” by Rivka Crowbourne. And where to start with the subjects ripe for satire! 2. Book Reviews (500-1,000 words)

Reviews do not have to be solely on books about craft. Is there a book whose structure or form inspired your own writing? Epistolary work like Ta-Nehisi Coates’ *Between the World and Me* or a novel-in-vignettes like Evan S. Connell’s *Mrs. Bridge*? How about Padgett Powell’s *The Interrogative Mood: A Novel?*, written entirely in questions?

3. Story of My Life: Self-Portraits (500 words or less)

WAG has a lot of memoir writers—this space is for you! Inspired by the Gainesville Fine Arts Association’s (GFAA) recent Self-Portrait exhibit, Susie Baxter’s *Write Your Memoir One Story at a Time*, and Kaye Linden’s *35 Tips for Writing Your Memoir in Short Stories (and in other short forms)*, give us a self-portrait in 500 words or less.

4. Writer’s Life / Writer’s Notebook (500-1,000 words)

We would love to see more personal essays on your writing life and writing journey. (Are you a writer who’s just gotten back into writing after a long hiatus? Are you someone who’s always wanted to write and has finally taken the leap? We want to hear from you!) We’re expanding this topic to include your writer’s notebook—the one you carry with you everywhere. Give us a peek! 



Staley's assured debut follows two women who take solace in their friendship while living in remote Nuvuk, Alaska, in 1976. Jesse Bookman is a lab aide at the Arctic Research Camp studying extreme cold on mammals. She's also just gotten pregnant by a predatory mentor. Kara Björnson, who is married to a delusional and volatile gold miner, raises their toddler Kalina in their small cabin, where she goes stir crazy. Both are pulled between the desire for personal fulfillment and the demands of motherhood, but otherwise their sensibilities are opposed. For instance, when the two women visit a cabin that once belonged to Jack London, Kara's ability to spiritually sense London's presence contrasts with Jesse's dependence on scientific evidence. Still, they bond over their discussions about motherhood, as Jesse, who grew up with a schizophrenic mother, wonders what kind of mother she will be and how a baby will affect her career. The story builds to a crisis after Jesse considers a job in Washington, D.C., which would separate her from Kara. Staley convincingly portrays her protagonists as hearty and introspective women concerned for their futures. Readers will admire this mature tale. 



I Would Rather See My Books Get Pirated Than This (Or: Why Goodreads and Amazon Are Becoming Dumpster Fires)

There's not much that makes me angry these days about writing and publishing. I've seen it all. I know what to expect from Amazon and Goodreads. Meaning: I don't expect much, and I assume I will be continually disappointed. Nor do I have the power to change how they operate. My energy-saving strategy: move on and focus on what you can control.

That's going to become much harder to do if Amazon and Goodreads don't start defending against the absolute garbage now being spread across their sites.

I know my work gets pirated and frankly I don't care. (I'm not saying other authors shouldn't care, but that's not a battle worth my time today.)

Why Goodreads and Amazon Are Dumpster Fires cont.

But here's what does rankle me: garbage books getting uploaded to Amazon where my name is credited as the author, such as:

- A Step-by-Step Guide to Crafting Compelling eBooks, Building a Thriving Author Platform, and Maximizing Profitability
- How to Write and Publish an eBook Quickly and Make Money
- Promote to Prosper: Strategies to Skyrocket Your eBook Sales on Amazon
- Publishing Power: Navigating Amazon's Kindle Direct Publishing
- Igniting Ideas: Your Guide to Writing a Bestseller eBook on Amazon

Whoever's doing this is obviously preying on writers who trust my name and think I've actually written these books. I have not. Most likely they've been generated by AI. (Why do I think this? I've used these AI tools extensively to test how well they can reproduce my knowledge. I also do a lot of vanity prompting, like "What would Jane Friedman say about building author platform?" I've been blogging since 2009—there's a lot of my content publicly available for training AI models. As soon as I read the first pages of these fake books, it was like reading ChatGPT responses I had generated myself.)

It might be possible to ignore this nonsense on some level since these books aren't receiving customer reviews (so far), and mostly they sink to the bottom of search results (although not always). At the very least, if you look at my [author profile on Amazon](#), these junk books don't appear. A reader who applies some critical thinking might think twice before accepting these books as mine.

Still, it's not great. And it falls on me, the author—the one with a reputation at stake—to get these misleading books removed from Amazon. I'm not even sure it's possible. I don't own the copyright to these junk books. I don't exactly "own" my name either—lots of other people who are also legit authors share my name, after all. So on what grounds can I successfully demand this stop, at least in Amazon's eyes? I'm not sure.

To add insult to injury, these sham books are getting added to [my official Goodreads profile](#). A reasonable person might think I control what books are shown on my Goodreads profile, or that I approve them, or at the very least I could have them easily removed. Not so.

Why Goodreads and Amazon Are Dumpster Fires cont.

If you need to have your Goodreads profile corrected—as far as the books credited to you—you have to reach out to volunteer “librarians” on Goodreads, which requires joining a group, then posting in a comment thread that you want illegitimate books removed from your profile.

When I complained about this on Twitter/X, an author responded that she had to report 29 illegitimate books in just the last week alone. 29!

With the flood of AI content now published at Amazon, sometimes attributed to authors in a misleading or fraudulent manner, how can anyone reasonably expect working authors to spend every week for the rest of their lives policing this? And if authors *don't* police it, they will certainly hear about it, from readers concerned about these garbage books, and from readers who credulously bought this crap and have complaints. Or authors might not hear anything at all, and lose a potential reader forever.

We desperately need guardrails on this landslide of misattribution and misinformation. Amazon and Goodreads, I beg you to create a way to verify authorship, or for authors to easily block fraudulent books credited to them. Do it now, do it quickly.

Unfortunately, even if and when you get these insane books removed from your official profiles, they will still be floating around out there, with your name, on two major sites that gets millions of visitors, just waiting to be “discovered.” And there’s absolutely nothing you can do about it.

Update (afternoon of Aug. 7): Hours after this post was published, my official Goodreads profile was cleaned of the offending titles. I did file a report with Amazon, complaining that these books were using my name and reputation without my consent. Amazon’s response: “Please provide us with any trademark registration numbers that relate to your claim.” When I replied that I did not have a trademark for my name, they closed the case and said the books would not be removed from sale.

Why Goodreads and Amazon Are Dumpster Fires cont.

Update (morning of Aug. 8): The fraudulent titles appear to be entirely removed from Amazon and Goodreads alike. I'm sure that's in no small part due to my visibility and reputation in the writing and publishing community. What will authors with smaller profiles do when this happens to them? If you ever find yourself in a similar situation, I'd start by reaching out to an advocacy organization like [The Authors Guild](#) (I'm a member).


Update (evening of Aug. 8): Since these fake books have been removed, I've added titles and screenshots below, as well as an explanation of why I believe the books are AI generated.


Classes and Conferences



the option of an all-expenses-paid residency at the [Civitella Ranieri Center](#), a renowned artists retreat housed in a fifteenth-century castle in Umbertide, Italy. Submissions are accepted only via [Submittable](#) between September 1st and October 31st.

- Submissions should be at least 48 pages of poetry, which must be primarily in English.
- For the purposes of this contest, a previously published full-length book of poems is defined as a volume of more than 40 pages that has been made readily available through trade distribution (i.e. local and/or on-line booksellers, including Amazon.com).
